As noted in the memo that was prepared on this issue, there are pros and cons to either nomenclature. This issue, however, is not a "priority one task" – which as explained, refers to the staff's methodology for determining unmitigated risk and safeguard scores. I think the better term here would be "non-discretionary" if the intention was to have the staff fulfill this request without it being displaced by other priorities. On the merits of this issue, the change would be as proposed, a reflection of the statutory language. I do not believe, however, that the authors of the statute were attempting to prescribe the title, rather describe the function, especially since the fact of the assignment of such individuals was left as discretionary.

As this has no bearing on safety, I do not feel strongly enough to vote in this matter and defer to the Board Members who are more concerned with this issue than I am.

This Amendment directs the following action:

"Special Project: Resident Inspectors. The Technical Director shall prepare, implement and complete, no later than September 30, 2017, a change management plan to transition the name of the Board's staff stationed at any Department of Energy defense nuclear facilities from 'Site Representatives' to 'Resident Inspectors' in order to match the statutory language of 41 U.S.C. § 2286b. (h).

"This is a priority one task, and the Technical Director shall accrue labor at his discretion from other approved tasks in this work plan in order to facilitate this effort."

Note that this amendment does *not* implicitly or explicitly signal the Board's intention to change the duties, roles, or responsibilities as a result of this name change.

The following historical perspective worth noting.

The first written reference to Board's staff stationed at DOE sites appears to be in the Board's Annual Report to Congress for 1992 (dated April 1993), which states twice that a member of the Board's staff had been assigned to Pantex as the Board's site representative. It does not discuss the choice of the term "site representative."

Interviews late last year with long-tenured current and former members of the Board's staff, the original Chairman and Vice Chairman, and another original Board Member found a common understanding of the rejection of the term "resident inspector" and origin of the term "site representative." The Board avoided the term "inspector" because the Board's functions do not include "inspection," and the Board

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has not established criteria against which to inspect. By comparison, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) resident inspectors perform inspections for compliance with NRC regulations. The Board apparently did not want to be perceived as overstepping its authority by assigning "inspectors" when its assigned functions did not include inspection. Moreover, the Board intended these people to be their "eyes and ears" and to work to understand the "bigger picture" instead of following a standard review plan or checklist. Inspection was perceived to be a completely different and undesired activity.

The Board may also have been influenced by the name of the Naval Reactors (NR) Representative's Offices (NRRO) maintained at field activities by NR, although NRRO activities were not completely analogous to those of site representatives. The interviews found general agreement that the personnel were stationed at the sites as representatives of the Board and thus were called "site representatives."

While the reasoning of the original Board may have been sound and well-intentioned, it violated one of the fundamental principles of the American tradition of self-government; namely, the rule of law. 41 U.S.C. § 2286b (h) authorized the Board to have "Resident Inspectors," not "Site Representatives." Instead of having the statute changed, the Board consciously chose to ignore the law and use a different term than the one Congress had directed. It continued this practice for two and a half decades. That the practical difference in the two terms was inconsequential is not relevant. Our respect for the rule of law must apply to all elements of the statute, big and small, and not just the ones we choose to follow or determine to be appropriate.

This amendment will improve alignment between the Board's enabling statute and its implementation, and it will demonstrate that the rule of law remains revered.

I therefore approve.
